

Financial Review


During these difficult times when income remains unpredictable, our Trustees are very grateful to those that donate and support the hospice and those who wish East Lancashire Hospice to benefit from leaving a legacy in their will.

As future grant funding remains uncertain, the hospice aims to continue to increase regular income through the development of lottery, regular giving, shops and fundraising events.



Income for the financial year ended 31st March 2013 totalled £3,392,768 and **Figure 1** shows percentages for each income stream.

Total expenditure for the year ended 31st March 2013 totalled £2,653,791 and **Figure 2** provides details of the major breakdowns. Budgeted expenditure for 2013/14 is £3,175,997 which accounts for planned maintenance and hospice service developments.

Warren's lasting legacy

Warren Wolstencroft celebrated his 39th birthday on 16 May this year as a patient in East Lancashire Hospice – in fact the kitchen staff baked him a cake and the nurses and volunteers gathered outside his room to sing 'Happy Birthday'.

What they didn't know was that the birthday boy was in the shower and he greeted the singing crowd wrapped in a towel dripping with water!

Twelve years ago Warren discovered he had cancer. He was medically discharged after serving in the Queen's Lancashire Regiment for seven years.

Warren, a member of the East Ribble District Freemasons, was born in Great Harwood and moved to Blackburn, the town of his beloved football team. He was surrounded by women with his four daughters Shelby, Phoebe, Bethany and Darcy and wife Michelle.

In 2001 it was found that Warren had cancer in his hand. From that moment, it was a long journey.

Warren was visited by a clinical nurse specialist (CNS) from the hospice and he had a number of complementary therapies. During this time he asked to have a look around the hospice. Later in his illness the CNS nurse asked if he would like to come as an inpatient and because of his visit he wasn't scared. Before he'd seen the hospice, Warren, like many others, thought it would be a grey and sad place where people only come to die.

As a patient Warren knew this was not the case and he did all he could to remove that stigma. He had many visitors during his time as a patient who were all surprised by the surroundings. Warren also posted pictures on his Facebook wall to show people what the hospice was really like.

"The hospice has made me feel safe and secure"

Warren said, "I am a proud, strong and strict parent. I don't want to die at home where my children will continue to live. I am happy to be here at the hospice, I love it and I would say to anyone who is coming to the hospice as a visitor or a patient, don't be scared. The hospice has made me feel safe and secure."

Sadly Warren passed away in July.

He had planned a Robbie Williams tribute fundraiser to take place at the Havelock Inn, Blackburn where he and wife Michelle first met. Warren sang a Robbie Williams song the

night they met. The evening was planned to take place just a few weeks after Warren passed away, but still went ahead raising over £1000.

Warren's wife Michelle said: "As Warren's proud wife I have to say what a courageous, brave, loyal man, husband, daddy, son and brother he was. He would leave a presence in any room and with whoever he met, be it good or bad! Throughout his illness he never let it get him down. He was always the joker and like a Sergeant Major with our girls!

"Warren's stay at the hospice, although sad, was also a happy haven for him and I always felt safe and reassured that my special man was in good hands. The hospice is a lovely, airy, peaceful, welcoming place, and Warren's final wish was to fall asleep there. As it happened, Warren passed at home peacefully with me holding him close as he will always stay.

"Our lives are in a different place now he has gone. A huge hole has been left that will never be filled.

"His family and friends will go on to fundraise for the hospice as Warren would have. It was a charity close to his heart. Warren and I have a lot of respect for all the staff and I want to thank all the nurses and doctors, staff and volunteers."
